REPLY COMMENTS OF WTA - ADVOCATES FOR RURAL BROADBAND

WTA – Advocates for Rural Broadband ("WTA")¹ submits its reply comments in support of the petition of Cordova Wireless Communications, LLC ("Cordova Wireless") for temporary waiver of the indoor location accuracy and related Phase II Enhanced 911 ("E911") service and reporting requirements of Section 20.18(i) of the Commission's Rules. WTA has standing to participate in this proceeding because Cordova Telephone Cooperative, Inc., the parent company of Cordova Wireless, is a WTA member.

WTA agrees with Cordova Wireless and commenter NTCA – The Rural Broadband Association that the key factor supporting the requested waiver is that the City of Cordova, Alaska — the operator of the only Public Safety Answering Point ("PSAP") that serves the customers and other potential users and beneficiaries of Cordova Wireless — has not requested that Cordova Wireless provide Phase II E911 service and is not presently capable of receiving and using indoor location accuracy data or other Phase II E911 location data. If the City of

Cordova's PSAP cannot receive or use indoor location or other Phase II E911 location data during the currently foreseeable future, it makes no sense for a small company like Cordova Wireless to invest its scarce resources to acquire and deploy E911 location equipment that is not useful now and that may be superseded or outmoded by the time that the City of Cordova may request Phase II E911 service.

Moreover, the waiver that Cordova Wireless requests is only a temporary one. It will end when the City of Cordova's PSAP can receive and use indoor location accuracy data and other Phase II E911 location data, and the City requests Cordova Wireless to provide Phase II E911 service.

The requested waiver fits well within the applicable waiver standards of Sections 1.3 and 1.925 of the Rules that the Commission reiterated in paragraph 157 of its *Fourth E911 Report and Order*.² Section 1.3 of the Rules permits the Commission's rules to be waived for good cause shown. The Commission may exercise its discretion to waive a rule where the particular facts make strict compliance inconsistent with the public interest. *Northeast Cellular Telephone Co. v. FCC*, 897 F.2d 1164, 1166 (D.C. Cir. 1990). In addition, the Commission may take into account considerations of hardship, equity, and the effective implementation of public policy on an individual basis. *WAIT Radio v. FCC*, 418 F.2d 1153, 1159 (D.C. Cir. 1969), *cert. denied*, 409 U.S. 1027 (1972).

Section 1.925 of the Rules indicates that the Commission may grant wireless waivers if it is shown that: (a) the underlying purpose of the rule would not be served or would be frustrated by application to the instant case, and that a grant of the requested waiver would be in the public interest; or (b) in view of the unique circumstances of the instant case, application of the rule

would be inequitable, unduly burdensome or contrary to the public interest, or the applicant has

no reasonable alternative.

The fact that the City of Cordova's PSAP – the only PSAP for the Cordova Wireless

service area -- cannot receive or use indoor location or other Phase II E911 location data

constitutes the particular fact and unique circumstance that makes strict compliance with Section

20.18(i) inconsistent with the public interest and that precludes the underlying public safety

purpose of that rule from being served. Moreover, in view of the City's present inability to use

the data, requiring Cordova Wireless to purchase and deploy equipment that has no use or public

benefit at this time is unduly burdensome, and would become wholly inequitable if such

equipment is superseded, outmoded or otherwise becomes unusable by the time that the City of

Cordova requests Phase II E911 service and is able to receive and use the applicable location

data. Because the City of Cordova's PSAP cannot currently receive or use indoor location or

other Phase II E911 location data, Cordova Wireless has no reasonable alternative but to request

a temporary waiver of Section 20.18(i) unless and until such time as the City's PSAP acquires

the necessary capabilities and the City requests Cordova Wireless to provide Phase II E911

service. In light of these facts and circumstances, WTA urges the Commission to grant the

requested temporary waiver.
